## MURDER & MADNESS IN GREEK TRAGEDY

An intensive examination of selected figures, themes, or issues in ancient Greek literature. Divinely induced madness; spousal murder; mothers killing their children; children killing their mothers; sibling rivalry and the threat of human sacrifice—all of these issues and more will be addressed as we read numerous works by the Greek tragedians Aeschylus, Sophocles and Euripides.

## GRECO-ROMAN ECONOMIES

A survey of the economic systems in the Greco-Roman world, focusing upon pre-classical Greek, classical Greek, and Roman societies. The course will discuss various models used to explain ancient economies, followed by case studies drawn from the ancient Mediterranean.

This course offers an in-depth study of the uses of laughter in antiquity. Students will gain greater insight into Greco-Roman culture. In the process, students will also learn much about themselves and the power of the words that they use.
